Synergy Services serves children, youth, adults and families who may have experienced any of the following: mental health crisis, emergency shelter needs, domestic violence, child abuse, sexual assault, classroom

disruption, homelessness, teen parenting or bullying.



life changing accomplishments of 2022

The 2023-2028 Long Range Plan was completed with staff, board members and community stakeholders in order to define the community's greatest unmet needs for children and families in crisis. This included addressing health needs of homeless youth, housing for survivors and mental/behavioral health needs of students across the community.

Over 1,000 individuals and families received holiday support after being adopted by community members.

Staff members and leaders collaborated to create new diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives and trainings

Synergy Services continued to address growing need in homelessness, mental health and family violence. To further support the Synergy Services staff, a greater Employee Assistance Program was built and initiated key workplace mental health practices to support both our staff and clients.

Three key programmatic changes were initiated to address to desperate need for accessible & affordable housing for survivors:

The Children's Center shifted to an attachment-based, short-term residential program to build connection, attachment and develop parenting skills for families that have experienced domestic violence.

Five apartments were added to the Transitional Living Program to continue to meet the needs of our community. These additions bring our total to 15 apartments and will increase the capacity to serve by 20 individuals annually.

Our Capital Campaign was launched to purchase a new property for the long-term Domestic Violence Housing Program. This project will add 18 apartments and provide additional client services to thousands of survivors annually.

Sideline The Stigma, in partnership with the Kansas City Current & Blue Cross Blue Shield, was launched and served 100 local youth with a purpose to reduce the stigma around mental health, while facilitating open and honest conversation with young people across the community.

603 individuals, 116 companies, 25 community organizations and 16 foundations together provided more than \$2.5 million in financial support. Their contributions made sure we could keep the services flowing for thousands of children, teens, families and domestic violence survivors in our community.

 Compassionate operators provide emotional support and referrals to shelters and other community resources for victims of family violence.

 A network of sites throughout the community to connect youth in danger with safe shelter or other assistance.

 A collaboration between Synergy and partner agencies to provide basic necessities and assist homeless young people in reaching educational, vocational and housing goals.

 medical/legal advocates guide survivors through the
 often complex medical and legal systems.

Emergency Shelter

 Emergency shelter and counseling for children from birth to age 12 who are in custody of the state, from families in crisis, or who have experienced violence.
- Synergy House: 816-741-8700
 Shelter and counseling for youth ages 12 to 18 who are in crisis due to abuse, family dysfunction, abandonment, homelessness or parental emergencies.
- Domestic Violence: Center 816-321-7050
 Emergency shelter and support services for adult domestic violence survivors and their children.

Temporary Housing

- Transitional Living: 816-505-4814
 18 months of stable housing, counseling, case management and support to enable youth and young families to transition from homelessness to self-sufficiency.
- Rapid Rehousing: 816-398-1966
 Safe, stable housing and the necessary support services to enable domestic violence survivors and their children to escape abuse without becoming homeless.

PROMOTE HEALING

- Medical, Dental & Vision Care: 816-505-4865
 Our on-site clinic is consciously designed and operated to overcome the barriers that prevent homeless and at-risk children and youth from accessing regular healthcare. A variety of services are provided utilizing collaborations between healthcare providers.
- Mental Health & Counseling Services: 816-587-4100
 A wide-range of counseling services to strengthen individuals and families and help them function in a healthy way including: Individual, Couple, Family & Group Counseling; Art, Movement, Music & Play Therapy; Other Behavioral Therapies
- School Based Integrated Services: 816-321-7470
 Trauma informed services delivered in schools to help students overcome trauma and develop the social and emotional skills necessary to be a successful learner and reach their full potential.
- Children's Advocacy Center: 816-321-7040
 A multidisciplinary team approach to preventing, investigating, prosecuting and providing healing services for child abuse victims. A collaboration between law enforcement, Children's Division and other child serving agencies to conduct forensic interviews and offer advocacy support to children and families who are navigating the child welfare system.

- Teen Parent Support: 816-505-4816
 Education, case management and mentoring for pregnant and parenting teens up to their 22nd birthday.
- Youth Resiliency Center: 816-741-8700
 A unique place that promotes growth and healing for at-risk youth through: a clinic providing medical, mental, dental and vision health services; support groups; computer lab and education center; creative arts center and recording studio; indoor basketball court and teaching kitchen; and a drop-in center for homeless youth to eat, take a shower and do laundry.
